Thank you for helping with the 45<sup>th</sup> Rockwood Christmas Bird Count on December 22, 2018. Three species new to the count were added this year: Wild Turkey, Pileated Woodpecker and White-eyed Vireo which brings the total species over the past 45 years to 164. The total number of species was 79, just shy of the count average of 82. Snowy and Northern Saw-whet Owls were present the day after the count, relegating them to count week status. No doubt both birds were present on the day of the count but eluded detection. The latter is a particularly good find; Northern Saw-whet Owls have only been on 7 past counts and one previous count week.

Forty-five years has provided enough data to warrant an objective definition of what species to consider usual or interesting: those seen on fewer than 15 previous counts. Seven species met the criteria: Chipping Sparrow (twice before), Tree Swallow (3 past counts), Merlin (4 other years), Horned Grebe (8 times previously), Gray Catbird and Northern Mockingbird (11 past counts) and Lesser Black-backed Gull (12 previous counts). Record numbers of Goldencrowned and Ruby-crowned Kinglets were counted; two parties had Ruby-crowned Kinglets. Redheads were also more numerous than usual, this year's count being the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest. The number of Tree Swallows was phenomenal, obviously setting a new record high. Tree Swallows were recorded at 3 different locations, which is also unusual.

The mild conditions before and on the day of the count affected both the numbers counted and the species total. It no doubt enhanced the Tree Swallow count. But the lack of snow and ice allowed birds to be anywhere--not concentrated in the usual winter locations. It also diminished the need to visit feeders; many people commented on the number of full feeders with no birds at them. American Tree Sparrow and Dark-eyed Juncos had record low counts and the number of Song Sparrows tied with 2015 for a record low. Hopefully these low numbers were the result of the mild conditions and not reflective of actual declines. With all water open, ducks and other water birds had free rein and most species were present in lower numbers than usual (Canvasback and Redhead being the exception) or missed entirely (Wood Duck, American Wigeon, Northern Shoveler, Northern Pintail, Green-winged Teal). The absence of American Wigeon was especially noteworthy, the species having been seen on 36 past counts and every count since 1990. American Coot had the lowest total in 25 years (since 1993). There were no shorebirds, something that might be expected with the mild conditions but that could have been anywhere if still present. Other usual species that were missed this year include Horned Lark and Brown-headed Cowbird (42 past counts), Northern Harrier and Yellow-rumped Warbler (40 past counts), Common Grackle (39 past counts) and Snow Bunting (35 past counts). With the exception of Pine Siskin, there were no winter finches.

Special thanks must go to Paul Cypher and Kevin Arnold for making the Lake Erie Metropark Marshlands Museum available for the tally and to Ava Landgraf who greatly helped with the area assignments and other logistical issues. The count was sponsored by the Detroit Audubon Society, which also provided the chili for lunch and the tally.

The 2019 count will be on **Saturday, December 21, 2019**. Please mark this date on your calendars and I sincerely hope this date will prove doable for everyone.
